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




About BBFORPEACE

Building Blocks for Peace Foundation (BBFORPEACE) is a youth-led network/non-governmental organization working on Conflict Prevention, Prevention of Violent Extremism, Peacebuilding, Accountability Governance, Climate Action and Sustainable Development. The organization has been incorporated with the Corporate Affairs Commission in Nigeria since 2017.

The organization which was founded by Rafiu Adeniran Lawal, began with its youth programme known as Nigeria Youth 4 Peace Initiative in 2016, a movement of young people who were dissatisfied with the increasing participation of young people in violent extremism caused largely by the massive socioeconomic and political deprivation in their communities, and the subsequent exclusion of youth from the negotiating table and the decision-making process and were committed to advocating for the meaningful and effective engagement of youth in the peacebuilding process in Nigeria.

We work towards the achievement of a peaceful society through innovative approaches such as policy advocacy, community dialogue, education, training, workshops, radio/TV presentations, sports, research, community sensitization, social media engagement, and arts to mention a few.

Overview of Our Projects in 2024

In 2024, Building Blocks for Peace Foundation engaged in several activities to achieve its goal. Our projects are as follows:

- The North-West Climate Peace-Hubs: A Climate Security Approach to Conflict Prevention
- Together for Peace: Combating Hate Speech Online and Offline
- Nigeria Civic Space and Security, South-West Nigeria
- Climate Action for Stronger Naija in Nasarawa State
- The Young Peacebuilders Fellowship
- West Africa Peace and Stability Programme

The North-West Climate-Peace Hubs: A Climate Security Approach to Conflict Prevention



As part of efforts aimed at preventing conflict through the climate security approach, in 2024, we embarked on a project titled Northwest Climate-Peace Hubs: A Climate Security Approach to Conflict Prevention

funded by UNDP Nigeria and the Embassy of Norway Abuja.

This project was implemented in Illela-Sokoto and Jibia-Katsina states respectively and it was aimed at combating conflict and insecurity

induced by the impacts of climate change such as environmental degradation, desertification, degraded pastures, and drought in Northwestern Nigeria.

We implemented the project through viable climate change adaptation and mitigation initiatives, including capacity-building training for 500 youths on dialogue, mediation, reconciliation, climate adaptation, and Early Warning and Early Response (EWER); establishing climate and conflict EWER structures; and planting of trees in strategic areas that are experiencing desert encroachment.

Project Objectives

The Northwest Climate Peace-Hubs Project is aimed at addressing the intersection of climate change, conflict, and insecurity in the northwest region of Nigeria, promoting peacebuilding and sustainable livelihoods

Project Outcomes

Below are the outcomes of the project:

- Increased awareness among participants and stakeholders about the impacts of climate change and its link with conflicts.
- Youths were empowered with skills in dialogue, mediation, and climate action, fostering a culture of peacebuilding and environmental stewardship.

- Improved environmental conditions through the planting of over 600 trees and provisions for rehabilitation of degraded pastures, contributing to ecosystem restoration and biodiversity conservation.
- Inspired Jibia Youth Student Association to commence a tree planting initiative.

Challenges

The following were the challenges encountered during the implementation of the project;

- Insecurity and restricted access to communities
- Communication difficulties due to poor network connection
- Instability of project beneficiaries due to the border nature of communities,
- The challenge of following up with beneficiaries due to incorrect information in the beneficiary's database.
- Initial scepticism on the sincerity of project goals on the part of the beneficiaries due to their NGO experience.
- Stereotypes around projects funded by donors; Stakeholders assume it offers free money.
- An attempt by stakeholders to exploit the project for personal gains
- Difficulty in reimbursing beneficiaries as many of them rely on their relatives' bank accounts to receive money.
- Change of local government officials, impacting continuity and sustainability.

- Destruction of some plants by community members in Jibia to build a mosque, even though the local government authority allocated all planted locations.

Lessons Learned

- The need for physical and person-to-person mobilization of beneficiaries rather than digital selection of beneficiaries to check follow-up challenges
- There is a need to identify focal persons within the relevant ministries and follow up with them closely rather than relying on official letter correspondence as most letters were attended to very late.

- Ensuring that project activities are not scheduled on a market day to encourage maximum participation
- There is a need to consider holding some training programs in the capital city to enhance participants' safety and comfort.
- Political diplomacy helped. The traditional ruler and LGA administrators assisted to a great degree. Aligning project objectives with state government agenda.
- Local language communication also ensured that the training was largely participatory and interactive since most beneficiaries were semi-literate.

Together for Peace: Combating Hate Speech Online and Offline

The Together for Peace: Combating Hate Speech Online and Offline supported by LEAP Africa and Nigeria Youth Futures Fund addressed the rapid spread of hate speech and harmful narratives including rumour, fake news and ethnic phobia which have had significant and far-reaching effects on many societies, including Nigeria.

We equipped 19 youths across all the six Area Councils in Abuja, Nigeria, with the right knowledge, skills and competencies to identify and combat harmful narratives online and offline.

These young persons also organised step-down training for other youths in their localities, thereby, multiplying the beneficiaries.





Project Objectives

The objectives of the project were to:

- Strengthen young people's competencies on how to address hate speech and produce campaigns that promote alternative narratives
- Foster healthy communication and intercultural learning among young people from diverse ethnicities and backgrounds, raising awareness of national values and social cohesion.
- Transform the minds and attitudes of young people on the need for unity, tolerance, and dialogue, embrace diversity and contribute to socio-political development.

After the launch of the initiative, selected participants from the different area councils in Abuja, were awarded seed grants to do a step-down training of what they have been trained on during the "Together for Peace: Combating Hate Speech Online and Offline" in their various area councils.

The stepdown activities included:

- **Abaji Area Council Team conducted their community activities**
 - They paid advocacy visits to key stakeholders in their community
 - Trained over 40 young men and young women in their community
 - They carried out a Peace Education intervention by combining students from three schools in Abaji to form a peace club.

Project Outcomes

One of the outcomes of the Together for Peace project was the creation of a youth network and community of practice called the **Champions of Peace Youth and Women Initiative**.

- Team Kwali concluded their community sensitization

- They were able to train over 40 youths in Kwali Area Council
- Paid advocacy visits to major gatekeepers of Kwali
- Trained students on the importance of being peace advocates and also equipped them with the skills and knowledge to combat hate speech in their school and in society at large.

- AMAC Team's Intervention

- They produced a '10 Netizen Commandments' which served as a wake-up call for every Nigerian citizen to refrain from hate, hate speech, and harmful narratives.
- They granted an interview on hate speech on Cool FM, Abuja
- Shot a 1-minute Drama to enlighten the listeners of the impacts of harmful narratives and encourage all to refrain from them.

- Kuje's local intervention

- They paid advocacy visits to the key stakeholders in their community
- They organised a step-down training on combating hate speech in Kuje
- Produced brochure on combating hate speech

- Team Bwari's Intervention

- They trained youths/religious/traditional rulers in their community on the efforts put in place to identify and combat hate speech in their community.
- They carried out Peace Education outreach

Challenges

- People With Disabilities faced various challenges including struggling in marketplaces and the workplace.
- Representatives of traditional leaders requested bribes for easy access into the king's palace.

Recommendations

- Champions should be empowered to carry out more community-centered interventions.
- Encouraged an increase in Monitoring and Evaluation at the step-down level of the initiative
- They hope to be engaged in more projects and volunteering activities



Nigeria Civic Space and Security:

1. Training of Trainers on Community Organising, Mobilisation and Non-Violence Civil Resistance in West Africa.

In commemoration of the 2024 International Youth Day, we partnered with Karibu Foundation, IPCR, Action Group on Free Civic Space, and GPPAC to organise a 2-Day Regional Training of Trainers for West African Youth on 'Community Organizing, Mobilizing, and Non-violent Civil Resistance.

The training brought together 24 young participants from Nigeria, Ghana, Senegal, Togo and Cote d'Ivoire, to learn and exchange best practices on young people's protection, how to step up advocacy against violations of young people's rights and protect the civic space across West Africa.



Project Objectives

The objectives of the training include:

- Enhance the awareness, skills, and knowledge of youth CSO leaders on effective advocacy strategies for civic space promotion and protection in West Africa;
- Raise awareness of the existing laws and policies that contribute to shrinking civic space in West Africa;
- Provide a platform for youth CSO leaders to

discuss and come up with concrete and actionable ideas and best practices for expanding and opening up the civic space in West Africa.

Project Outcomes

Some of the outcomes of the training:

- Increased awareness and capacity of youth CSO leaders to lead advocacy on civic space promotion and protection;
- Had a clearer understanding of the existing laws and policies that contribute to shrinking civic space in West Africa;
- Develop a platform/network for youth CSO leaders to share experiences and call for action.



Challenges

- One of the basic challenges encountered during the project implementation was that the training was scheduled to be held shortly after the **#EndBadGovernance** nationwide protest in Nigeria, which almost led to the postponement of the training as flights were equally suspended.



2. Training of Female Amotekun Corps on Mainstreaming Gender and Human Rights in Community Policing and Security

BBFORPEACE organised a one-day training titled 'Mainstreaming Gender and Human Rights in Community Policing and Security.' Female Officers from the Southwest Regional Security Outfit code-named 'Amotekun' from Lagos, Ogun, Oyo, Ondo, Osun and Ekiti States were trained adequately. They were equipped with the tools to address gender-based violence, harassment, and human rights abuses, fostering a more inclusive security environment.

This was part of efforts to ensure the protection of women's rights, build the capacity of the officers to handle violations properly and also establish and strengthen gender desks across the Amotekun Corps station across the six states in the southwestern part of Nigeria. This training was implemented in collaboration with the DAWN Commission and with support from the Action Group on Free Civic Space.



Project Objectives

The objectives of the project include;

- Enlighten and educate Amotekun corps members on gender-sensitive matters.
- Educate them on gender mainstreaming and how to integrate it into their system.

Project Outcomes

At the end of the training, Amotekun officers gained a deeper understanding of the importance of gender mainstreaming and also established a Gender Desk Office within the Amotekun Commands.

Climate Action for Stronger Naija in Nasarawa State

The 'Empowering Youth Civil Society to Build Stronger Communities' project (Climate Action for Stronger Naija) funded by the Nigeria Youths SDGs Network and the German Mission in Nigeria aimed to build the capacity of young people and youth civil society organisations in Nasarawa to contribute towards the implementation of Nigeria's National Adaptation Plan (NAP) and the National Determined Contributions (NDC).

During the implementation of the project, we cascaded the knowledge gained from the capacity-building sessions conducted by the Nigeria Youth SDGs Network to ten other civil society organizations in Nasarawa State, including youth, women, and PWD groups in a step-down training.

We stepped down the training to 10 CSOs in Nasarawa State, providing the participants

with a solid foundation on the NAP and NDCs, which is crucial for advancing climate action, locally. We further conducted a community dialogue in Lafia, bringing together 70 stakeholders to facilitate a comprehensive discussion on Nasarawa State's unique climate issues and potential solutions.

A local climate action network was also established which worked collaboratively with civil society organizations, government, and other relevant stakeholders to host a policy dialogue aimed at identifying climate adaptation and mitigation solutions, created a Local Adaptation Plan of Action (LAPA) for Nasarawa State, and also ensured meaningful engagement in the implementation of National Adaptation Plan (NAP) and National Determined Contribution.



Project Objectives

The project was aimed at strengthening the resilience of communities in Nasarawa State to climate change by addressing specific local vulnerabilities and risks.

Challenges

- Time Constraint
- Budget Constraint

Lessons Learned

During the implementing period, we discovered other existing efforts on some of our key action points, highlighting the importance of needs assessment

Project Outcomes

At the end of the implementation period, we

- Increased understanding among beneficiaries and stakeholders about climate change impacts and opportunities for adaptation and mitigation in Nasarawa State.
- Fostered partnerships and collaborations among government, private sector, civil society, and local communities to address climate challenges in Nasarawa State.
- Identification of focused and tailored strategies to address Nasarawa State's unique climate challenges.
- The motivation of the local communities to develop and implement climate-resilient projects and Nigeria's climate policies at the state and local levels.

The Young Peacebuilders Fellowship

In 2024, we received over 800 applications out of which 37 applicants were selected as the first cohort of the Young Peacebuilders Fellowship. Each of these applicants represented the 36 states in Nigeria and the FCT. During the Fellowship, young people were trained in several field areas on Youth, Peace and Security including; Introduction to Peacebuilding, Youth Peace and Security Agenda, Conflict Analysis, Conflict Transformation and Conflict Management, Communication and Advocacy for Peace, Spirituality and Peacebuilding, Project Design and Management, Resource Mobilisation and Fundraising and Networking and Partnership Building.

The Young Peacebuilders Fellowship implemented in collaboration with the Temple Foundation and Peace Shapers was an initiative designed towards mobilising actions for the domestication of the United Nations Security Council Resolutions 2250, 2419 and 2535, African Union Continental Framework on Youth, Peace and Security and existing national framework on Youth, Peace and Security (YPS) in Nigeria.

At the end of the fellowship, seed grants were awarded to two fellows: Bawa Igbe who represented Benue state and Tonye Marclint represented the FCT, Abuja. These Fellows' proposals addressed some of the major issues in Nigeria and the projects were successfully implemented.



Projects Implemented by the Grantees of the 2024 Young Peacebuilders Fellowship

■ Empowering and Building Social Inclusion for Young Persons Affected by Armed Conflict by Tonye Marclint Ebiede

With support from Building Blocks for Peace Foundation, Temple Foundation and the Peace Shapers, one of the grantees, Tonye Marclint Ebiede implemented the project “Empowering and Building Social Inclusion for Young Persons Affected by Armed Conflict” in Abuja, Nigeria.

The project aimed to spotlight the unique challenges faced by young people displaced by conflict, mentor and empower them with the tools necessary to thrive despite these hardships.

The project was initiated in celebration of the International Day of the Girl Child, emphasizing the importance of empowering girls in conflict-affected regions. In the course of the training, 50 girls at Durunmi IDP camp were mentored on peacebuilding and trained on how to make hair products (homemade shampoo)

■ Water for Peace by Bawa Igbe Gift

Bawa Igbe Gift, who is also a grantee of the 2024 Young Peacebuilders Fellowship, initiated a project “Water For Peace” in Benue State. The project was aimed at addressing the water crisis between host communities and Internally Displaced Persons to reduce the conflict through improved water access and sanitation. By creating communal water sources that serve as venues for mediation and collaboration, peace was meaningfully achieved in the community.

The project also strengthened local water management and sanitary practices in Agatu, Benue State while promoting joint water department projects to enhance communication and cooperation between divided groups.

With the creation of Agatu Mediation and Water Sanitation and Hygiene Group, this project improved and provided sustainable inclusive water, and sanitation practices, and also fostered mediation practices between host communities and IDPs.

General Objectives of the Project

The Young Peacebuilders Fellowship was aimed at;

- Deepening the knowledge and skills of young people about Peace, conflict resolution and development
- Create a network of young peacemakers who are committed to promoting peace within their communities and exchanging best practices with one another

- Support fellows technically and financially in designing and implementing peace projects that address local and global challenges
- Amplify the work and voices of young people in policy discussions related to peace and security.

Project Outcomes

At the end of the project, young people's capacities were strengthened to engage and catalyse their work in conflict prevention and peacebuilding across Nigeria.

Peace and Stability in West Africa (GPPAC West Africa Coordination

1. GPPAC West Africa Steering Group Meeting:

The meeting which brought together all the national coordinators of GPPAC across West Africa, was aimed at assessing the current peace and security landscape in West Africa, with a detailed analysis of the conflict dynamics in the Republic of Niger.

The discussions centered around security issues and violent extremism, governance and corruption, climate change, mining, and environmental degradation, youth unemployment, and migration.

Objectives

- To assess the current security landscape in West African countries, with a detailed analysis of the conflict dynamics in the Republic of Niger.
- To provide a platform for regional coordinators to share their experiences and strategies in addressing conflict and insecurity.

- To develop actionable recommendations for strengthening regional cooperation in peacebuilding and security management.
- To promote dialogue and cooperation among key stakeholders in the region, including civil society, government representatives, and international partners.



Outcomes

- Enhanced understanding of the security dynamics affecting West Africa, particularly in Niger.
- Strengthened regional connection, cooperation, and collaboration among GPPAC West Africa members.
- Concrete recommendations and strategies for addressing regional security challenges.
- Development of a roadmap for coordinated action by GPPAC West Africa members to support peace and security efforts in the Republic of Niger and the broader West African region.



2. Roundtable Discussion with AU Youth Ambassador - Ms. Simone Mbode:

In collaboration with GPPAC West Africa and the African Union, we held a Special Roundtable Discussion with the African Union Youth Ambassador for Peace for West Africa, Ms. Simone Mbode.



The objective of the meeting was to provide a space for the Ambassador to raise awareness on the African Union Continental Framework on Youth, Peace and Security and also share her vision, priorities, and programmes on youth and peacebuilding in West Africa.

The youth present at the roundtable also seized the opportunity to articulate their expectations, concerns, and recommendations for advancing the YPS agenda in Nigeria/West Africa.

SOME EVENTS ATTENDED IN 2024



We were in Japan to Participate in the ISG Meeting Organized by GPPAC

As the regional Secretariat of GPPAC, in January, we joined other peacebuilders from across the world to attend the International Steering Group Meeting by Global Partnership for the Prevention of Armed Conflict.

During the session, we had the opportunity to brief members of the Japanese Parliament and civil society in Tokyo about the peace and security dynamics in West Africa, what GPPAC members are doing and at the end, we called for all possible support towards addressing the existing challenges.



We Participated in the AU Expert Review on National Action Plans on Youth, Peace and Security

As a formidable organisation working on the Youth, Peace and Security agenda in Africa, BBFORPEACE's director attended and participated in the African Union Expert Review on the Guidelines for the Development and Implementation of National Action Plans on Youth Peace and Security in Africa, which was held in Dakar, Senegal.

This guiding document when published will provide the needed step-by-step process for the African Union member states to develop and implement national roadmaps on Youth, Peace and Security.



We were Duly Represented at the 2024 Youth Voices for Change Summit

As part of efforts aimed at advocating for youth's involvement in policy discussions in alignment with the principles of the UN Security Council Resolution 2250 and ECOWAS Vision 2050, our Communications Manager joined other West African youths in Accra, Ghana, to participate in the 2024 Youth Voices for Change Summit, organised by ECOWAS.

The summit, which brought together youth delegates from various West African countries, focused on amplifying young people's voices with a particular emphasis on Youth Digital Innovation for Inclusivity, Regional Growth, and Stability.

The summit concluded with a strong call from West African youth for the establishment of innovation hubs across ECOWAS member states, increased investment in digital entrepreneurship, and grassroots initiatives to bolster peace and security through digital technology.



We were in the Hague

Represented by our project officer, we joined other young peacebuilders in The Hague, Netherlands, to participate in the International Steering Group Meeting of United Network of Young Peacebuilders to brainstorm and set strategic priorities for UNOY's next strategic plan.

As the International Steering Group Representative of UNOY in West and Central Africa, Ese shared the work we do at BBFORPEACE and other works by other members of the UNOY.



We were a Part of the KPAC'24

As the regional secretariat of GPPAC West Africa, we were in Dakar, Senegal to attend and participate in the KPAC 24 conference organized by Knowledge Platform Security and Rule of Law, REPAOC and Goree Institute, supported by the Kingdom of Netherlands.

The conference brought together hundreds of practitioners, policy makers and researchers working on peace and security across the

world to explore the theme: building trust, pacifying power and connecting realities. At the conference, we engaged in sessions and discussions around the best practices in building trust, pacifying power and connecting realities and imagined how the future of these themes will look like, and we also had the opportunity to display our peace materials.



We contributed to National and Regional Peace and Stability

As the regional secretariat of the Global Partnership for the Prevention of Armed Conflict West Africa, our Executive Director at Building Blocks for Peace Foundation visited the Republic of Niger to conduct an on-site assessment of the peace and security situation of the country and interact with relevant actors working on peace and security including GPPAC Niger members on the opportunities for engagement and how best to support the country.

Since the military took over in 2023, there has been an increasing need to support the people of Niger to continue to ensure national and regional peace and stability.

His visit is part of the series of engagements that Global Partnership for the Prevention of Armed Conflict will be leading in Niger as part of the project 'Contributing to Peaceful and Safe Societies' funded by the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
